Hockley is the beating heart of Nottingham's weekend party scene, and as such you'll see dozens of bars vying for custom. Many have come and gone over the years - often trying to be "the next big thing". Some are hidden away through secret entrances, others boast constantly long queues and sky high drinks prices.

So it's nice to be able to step away from the gimmicks and enjoy some of the area's more traditional watering holes. You can still find great ale here, and a growing craft beer scene. Divert from the main trail, and you may find yourself in a sandstone cave. Head across Sneinton Market and discover old haunts where the locals drink.


If you fancy a bite, you'll also find a wide selection of restaurants here, ranging from Chinese, Japanese and Korean dishes to tasty Mediterranean tapas. There are also plenty of cheaper takeaways to line the stomach.

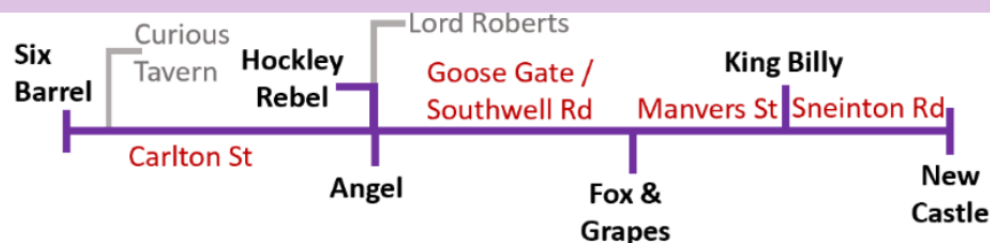
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**The Six Barrel Draffhouse** is a good place to begin, being very close to the Nottingham tram network and plenty of bus routes. It's a pretty even mix of cask and craft beer here - if you're a fan of the latter head to the back of the bar and look inside the mahoosive fridge.

Take time to stop off at the **Hockley Rebel** where real ale is the star of the bar - recently refurbished and with the air of a proper no nonsense. Craft features heavily at the **Angel Microbrewery**, which has been transformed from a dark dungeon of sticky carpets to a well run bar with - as the name suggests - its own beers.

Head down the hill to the bottom of Hockley, cross over Sneinton Market and on make your way to the **Fox and Grapes**. Back in the day it would open at first light to serve the market trader. Fully refurbished, you find a great selection of Castle Rock Ales



Cross the busy Southwell Road and up Manvers Street to discover a real slice of Nottingham tradition. In the **King Billy**, you're likely to meet some real characters and sample yet more fine cask ale. On a warm day, head up to the roof garden - an unexpected treat.

Finally, one block away is the local's local, **The New Castle**. This place is strictly no frills with around four rotating real ales at the bar and food served most days.

**Note** : You can divert from this trail to visit the Curious Tavern (George St) - with real ale in the main bar and the Lost Caves bar in the basement. The Lord Roberts - on Broad Street - also offers a good selection of real ale.
